U21 ECR Workshop 2017 - Registration Information

The information below is provided to help you fill out the registration form for the U21 ECR workshop on Interculturality and Multiculturalism: the challenges for changing societies.

Parallel workshops

Part of the programme will be a parallel workshop activity. The registration form asks you to indicate which of the workshops you would prefer to participate in, and to give a priority order (1st preference, 2nd preference, 3rd preference). Details of the three workshops are below:

- Analytic Intentionality: Data analysis is crucial in qualitative research; influencing the quality and applicability of the results. Analytical intentionality is proposed as a way to deal with analysis considering: the reflexivity of the researcher and research team; a polyphonic listening that opens new and multiple options for analysis; and a systematic writing exercise as a way of building and disseminating knowledge.
- Multilevel Hierarchical Analyses: Multilevel (or hierarchical) models have become an
 indispensable methodological tool in the social sciences. With a unitary statistical
 framework; they can be used to estimate many different types of models and analyse many
 different data structures such as longitudinal/panel data; cross-national survey data;
 educational standardized tests; ego-centric network data; and many others. This workshop
 will review the basic theoretical elements of multilevel models and show how to apply them
 using STATA and R through interesting examples taken from sociology; political science and
 psychology.
- Longitudinal Trajectory Analyses: To longitudinally analyze the ways by which social, political, historical, cultural, biological and economic factors shape and influence human behaviour and vice versa. The teaching of developmental trajectories will be the focus of this workshop. A theoretically funded and applied approach will be used to ensure the interaction among developmental roots; methodological issues and practical requests.

Presentations

Delegates are asked to indicate on the form if they wish to give an oral or poster presentation (or both) at the workshop. Oral presentations will take the form of a concise presentation in the style of a Pecha Kucha or Ignite talk. Giving concise presentations is a useful skill to learn for presenting to non-academic audiences e.g. policy makers or the general public. These presentation styles allow for fast paced presentations whereby a set number of slides are used, which are shown for a set amount of time (Pecha Kucha is 20 slides, 20 seconds each; Ignite is 20 slides, 15 seconds each). Depending on the number of delegates wishing to present concise presentations we may have to limit the number of presentations and/or the time for each presentation (at a previous workshop we used a shortened format of 10 slides, 20 seconds each). The organisers will make this decision following the registration deadline of 7 July 2017, note that if your registration is late you will only be guaranteed a poster presentation.
